


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

Reflections for the Nativity of the Lord

The glory of the Lord shone around them. The shepherds were going about their daily life, tending the sheep, when they were suddenly surrounded by the glory of the Lord, The whole world is wrapped in glory. Two millennia ago, as well as today, the word of God is born, the eternal Lord lowered himself to enter into human life. With the angels, we proclaim this news of great joy: God has become man, and has filled humanity with this glory. *Glory to God in the highest!*

Strive to Comprehend the Mystery

God is on earth, God is among us, not now as lawgiver—there is no fire, trumpet blast, smokewreathed mountain, dense cloud, or storm to terrify whoever hears him—but as one gently and kindly conversing in a human body with his fellow men and women. God is in the flesh...

How can the God-head be in the flesh? In the same way as fire can be in iron: not by moving from place to place but by the one imparting to the other its own properties. Fire does not speed toward iron, but without itself undergoing any change it causes the iron to share in its own natural attributes. The fire is not diminished and yet it completely fills whatever shares in its nature. So is it also with God the Word. He did not relinquish his own nature and yet *he dwelt among us. He* did not undergo any change and yet *the Word became flesh.* Earth received him from heaven, yet heaven was not deserted by him who holds the universe in being.

Let us strive to comprehend the mystery. The reason God is in the flesh is to kill the death that lurks there. As diseases are cured by medicines and assimilated by the body, and as darkness in a house is dispelled by the coming of light, so death, which held sway over human nature, is done away with by the coming of God... [W]hen the grace of God our Savior appeared and the Sun of Justice rose, death was swallowed up in victory, unable to bear the presence of true life. How great is God's goodness, how deep God's love for us!

St. Basil the Great, Homily on the Birth of the Lord

Basil the Great (ca. 329–379), was bishop of Caesarea in Cappadocia, Asia Minor (modern-day Turkey). One of the three "Cappadocian Fathers," Basil is also a Doctor of the Church.

Reflections for The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph

If you knew you were destined to inherit everything your heart desires, how would you act in everyday life? If you knew that, ultimately, you will be taken care of, how would that knowledge alter your daily disposition? This is what John tells us, "Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have confidence in God and receive from him whatever we ask, because we keep his commandments and do what pleases him." If we truly believe this, daily anxieties can be put in a healthy perspective.

The Place We Truly Belong

My children are near the age of Jesus in today's Gospel, which means there are times I only generally know where they are—down the street or in the park. Like Mary and Joseph in the caravan, I usually assume my children are where they are supposed to be.

So I feel Mary and Joseph's panic upon discovering Jesus is not with them and can understand the agony of a three-day search for their son. It would be hard not to feel that such anxiety was something your child had "done to you." Yet Jesus tells his parents they had no need for anxiety because they should have known exactly where to find him. They should have known he wasn't supposed to be with them at that moment. Earlier in Luke, when Mary and Joseph bring the infant Jesus to the temple, Simeon takes him from his mother's arms and proclaims God's blessing. Even earlier in the nativity story, Mary and Joseph hear strangers claim their son for all humanity.

Neither do our children ever belong to us alone. They belong to the world and to others, who will know them in ways we never will. Despite this, I will always search for my children and hope to bring them home. But I also hope that when I find them in a place where they truly belong, even if it is apart from me, I will recognize that God is with them—the same God who will notice when I am absent and search for me. I live in the hope that we will always be found, and therefore always be together.





WHAT IS THE SYNOD?

Objective & Purpose

The objective of the Synodal Process is to listen to what the Holy Spirit is saying to the Church.

The purpose of this synod is intended to inspire people to dream about the Church we are called to be, to make people's hopes flourish, to stimulate trust, to bind up wounds, to weave new and deeper relationships, to learn from one another, to build bridges, to enlighten minds, warm hearts, and restore strength to our hands for our common mission.

What happens in a Dialogue Session?

Part 1: Listen to the Holy Spirit through prayer, scripture, and a reflection.

Part 2: Discussion orientation and framework questions (see the right column for the Big Question and themes)

Part 3: Listening (each participant joins a small group of <10 people and has 3-5 minutes to share his or her thoughts on any of the themes)

Part 4: Dialogue and reflection between group members.

Synod Prayer

We stand before You, Holy Spirit, as we gather together in Your name. With You alone to guide us, make Yourself at home in our hearts;

Teach us the way we must go and how we are to pursue it. We are weak and sinful; do not let us promote disorder. Do not let ignorance lead us down the wrong path nor partiality influence our actions.

Let us find in You our unity so that we may journey together to eternal life and not stray from the way of truth and what is right.

All this we ask of You, who are at work in every place and time, in the communion of the Father and the Son, forever and ever. Amen.

The Big Question:

The Church's mission is to proclaim the gospel, journey together, and serve others. How can the church best live out this mission?

- 1. As **Companions on the Journey**, are all of the people of God included?
- 2. Are we **Listening** to everyone, especially minorities, the vulnerable, people living on the margins and those who feel separated from the Church?
- 3. **Speaking out:** what enables or hinders speaking up courageously and responsibly in our local church?
- 4. **Celebration:** how should the church promote active participation of all the faithful in Mass? How can it inspire and guide our common life and mission of the church?
- 5. **Sharing Responsibility for our Common Mission:** how do we ensure the various social ministries of the church are active and supported by all of the faithful?
- 6. **Dialogue in Church and Society:** what particular issues in the Church and society need more attention?
- 7. **Ecumenism:** how can the Church community relate with members of other Christian traditions and denominations?
- 8. Authority and Participation: how is authority exercised within our local Church? How are lay ministers promoted and lay people encouraged as co-responsible members?
- 9. **Discerning and Deciding:** how does the Church make decisions and how can it be improved to include and promote transparency and accountability?
- 10. Forming Ourselves in Synodality: how do we form people to be more capable of walking together, listening to one another, participating in mission and engaging in dialogue?

Deacon Harold, a Benedictine Oblate, is the author of the best-selling book, Behold the Man: A Catholic Vision of Male Spirituality, and has written the acclaimed work, Father Augustus Tolton: The Slave Who Became the First African American Priest. Lenten Mission Topics

Rich in Mercy: Finding Healing in God's Mercy

Beginning with the teaching of Saint John Paul II and his father's incredible conversion story, Deacon Harold will probe the depths of God's merciful love to help you find the forgiveness, healing, and peace that your hearts longs for.

Baptized into His Death: The Power of the Cross and Its Meaning in Our Lives

In this talk, Catholic speaker and evangelist Deacon Harold Burke-Sivers will answer the question, "Why did Jesus have to die?" by offering some reflections on Psalm 22 and the meaning of authentic freedom. Deacon Harold will help you discover the meaning of human suffering and how it draws us into the Paschal Mystery, drawing a connection between God's holy will and the obedience of faith.

Behold Your Mother: The Marian Heart of Suffering

Mary is the perfect disciple of the Lord who was filled with the Holy Spirit (Luke 1:35), and who always leads us to her Son. Deacon Harold will show that through prayer in the Holy Spirit during times of pain and suffering, we can unite our hearts to the pierced soul of the Blessed Mother thus uniting ourselves more closely to the crucified Christ.

A Light in the Darkness: Seeing Christ in the Sacrament of Reconciliation

This presentation will explore the nature and reality of sin, examine why it is so destructive to a man's relationship with God, and recognize the need for conversion and reconciliation by looking at how the Sacrament of Confession restores, deepens, and strengthens men's relationship with our Heavenly Father.


