Reflection

It might seem alarming to some that Jesus says that he came to bring division, not peace. Jesus is talking about the cost of doing the will of God. He speaks of accomplishing something great- the realization of God's kingdom- & doing so with the kind of passion & fortitude that might harm our relationships with others. Others might have lukewarm responses to discipleship, an attitude that could cause rifts & conflicts. Jesus challenges us to continue to work & make this our highest priority.

The Fire in Our Belly

During these days—and weeks & months—when it feels as if the entire world is on fire, oh how we wish the blazing would just stop already. Same with the ever-deepening divisions. Enough. Too much.

We know, we know. Jesus is not talking about destructive, death-dealing fire in today's Gospel. What John the Baptist says earlier of Jesus is a comforting corrective: *He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit & fire* (Luke 3:16). Similarly, this Pentecost plea: *Come, Holy Spirit, come. Fill us with the fire of your love.*

We know, we know. Jesus wants nothing more than for us to live peaceably with one another: Every kingdom divided against itself will be laid waste, & no town or house divided against itself will stand (Matt 12:25). & there's this: I pray, Father, that they may be one as we are one (John 17:21-22).

The thing is, when the fire in our belly is of God, tension—even division—is inevitable. Ask Jeremiah. Ask John the Baptist. Ask Jesus.

This love stuff can be so very hard. We shouldn't be surprised if the world seems hell-bent on getting us to tamp it down. But as a Church, we should know better. St. Paul admonishes us: *Do not quench the Spirit. Do not despise prophetic utterances* (1 Thess 5:19-20). So if the "fire-prevention" efforts come from within the Church—God, that hurts. It burns. Because *there is a baptism with which we are baptized* . . .

Receive the light of Christ . . . keep the flame alive.

We know, we know. These are not just words. This fire is not just of God. It is God. Fiery Love is who we are as disciples of Christ. & of this blazing beauty, there can never be too much.

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

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

May the grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with us always.

Synodality means walking together as Church. The journey requires us to look at Jesus' example of encounter. When our Holy Father, Pope Francis, opened the Synod on October 10, 2021, he began his homily by reminding us that Jesus was always on a journey, walking beside people in his ministry. Pope Francis asked, "Are we prepared for the adventure of this journey?"

A primary objective of the synod process was to journey together as Church to listen and dialogue. Today, in achieving that objective, I am publishing the report on what the participants shared during the local phase of the Synod on Synodality. I invite you to read the report prayerfully on our archdiocesan website at www.aoaj.org.

I thank everyone who participated in the synod and all who prayed for its success. I also thank the members of the synod committee who spent many hours shepherding and organizing the process. Our report has been submitted to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB).

The synod process now moves to the Continental phase, where Catholics from regions of the world will gather and synthesize reports this Fall. In October of 2023, representative bishops from around the world will gather in Rome with Pope Francis to discuss the reports from all continents.

As the Synod process moves forward, may the Holy Spirit continue to guide and direct the efforts of our Holy Father and the worldwide Church.

RESTORE THE CHURCH BUILD THE FUTURE

I should no longer say that I have neighbors to help, but that I must myself be a neighbor to others.

In the past 30 years, Croatia has undergone significant change. The end of the communist system was followed by the breakup of the former Yugoslavia, of which Croatia was a part. Today, although Croatia is a member of the European Union, the country's economy still struggles with poverty levels close to 20%, and many young people who are educated have difficulty finding jobs. At the same time, new and vulnerable populations such as seniors, people with disabilities, homeless people, orphans, and refugees bring both material and social needs. The communist legacy in this region destroyed civil society and volunteerism, but young Catholics in Croatia, guided by the Church's social teaching, are being empowered to reengage and make a difference.

The 72 Hours Without Compromise project is organized by the Student Catholic Centre Palma and engages young Croats between the ages of

16 and 30, in ten cities and one municipality, by promoting volunteer service to those on the margins. Project participants come together from Thursday evening through Sunday morning; they richly experience the Church's mission by attending the opening and closing Masses of the weekend and learning and applying Catholic principles of solidarity in service to those in need. In the course of service projects, these young people also learn skills they can then use to secure employment.

Support from the Church in Central and Eastern Europe Collection has helped make 72 Hours Without Compromise a success, extending it beyond the capital city of Zagreb into cities and towns across the country. When you participate in the collection, you help young people such as these participants to put their faith into action, rebuild the fabric of society, and acquire valuable skills that improve their job opportunities.


