Reflection: Dec 25, Solemnity of the Nativity of the Lord

Glory to God in the highest! When Jesus was born angels rejoiced, a star shone brightly in the sky, both Jewish shepherds and non-Jewish wise men came to adore him, and Jesus, the long awaited Messiah, was lying in a feeding place for animals. God chose a young woman named Mary to be his mother, and a small town called Bethlehem as a place for his Son to be born as a vulnerable baby. God's Son could have come to us as a strong king, with earthly power and influence, but God chose to come as a baby. Small and vulnerable must not mean the same thing to God! This baby wrapped in swaddling clothes is the Prince of Peace, Mighty God, Wonderful Counselor!

Which Word Would He Be?

In the beginning was the Word, but what kind? Today the metaphor leaps to life. If we borrowed a page from language textbooks, which Word would Jesus be?

He is a noun: solid and concrete, personal and present.

He is a verb: active in our world, always on the move.

He is a preposition: expressing relationship and linking everything.

He is a pronoun: close and intimate.

He is a gerund: the verb of eternal action.

He is adjective and adverb: enriching and describing how to live.

This Word is also punctuation, every exclamation mark of joy, every question mark of mystery. He is thought and pre-thought, present to the non-verbal and the pre-verbal. He is in our ears, lips, eyes, and hands—every way language is expressed. He is Alpha and Omega, every letter in every language, even the silence and space between words, where possibility dwells among us.

If Scripture is a library of divine love, then today is the birthday of the Great Book, the Word written across every page.

Today is born to us a savior, the newborn babe who cries and cannot speak, whose first words are yet to come, whose teaching and preaching will change the world. If we are words within the Word, what will we speak in his honor? What will we become in his name?

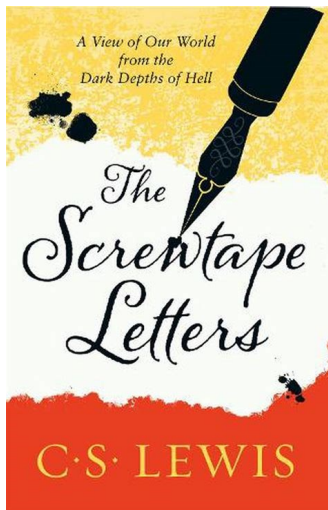

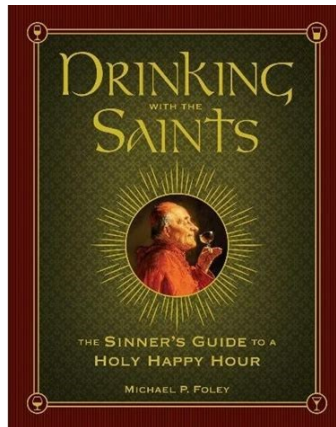
Lectio: Eucharist

Reflection: Jan 1, Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God

The shepherds work with animals; they know mangers. A contemporary equivalent to this scene would be an office worker visiting someone else's office and finding that someone has given birth on a desk. The extraordinary has entered the very mundane, the very ordinary. God really truly entered into *this* life. *Our* life. And God remains with us, here and now, present in our midst.

She's Our Mother Too

As we celebrate the beginning of a new year, the Church gives us a solemn feast, *Mary, the Mother of God*.

But God has no beginning, so how can God have a mother? Well, there's always been a Catholic logic in response to that. Here's the syllogism: Mary is the mother of Jesus. Jesus is God. Therefore, Mary is the mother of God.

Who, really, was Mary? Christian spirituality offers us two complementary versions of the Blessed Virgin—one from *Piety*, the other from *Scripture*.

The *Mary of Piety* is the Mary of devotions: Mary of the rosary (which is grounded in Scripture), of Guadalupe and Lourdes and Fatima, of pilgrimages and shrines, of litanies and Marian devotions everywhere. She is the one whom millions upon millions turn to in their need, seeking the guidance, comfort, and sympathy of a mother. The *Mary of Piety* is a rich mysticism of the poor—and of the poor in spirit.

The *Mary of Scripture* comes to us in two forms. In Matthew and Luke, she is presented as the model of discipleship. Yes, Mary is Jesus' mother, but she is *the* exemplary disciple, the one who is pregnant with God's Word and who most faithfully carries the tension inherent in discipleship. Moreover, in Luke's Gospel, she gives voice to how God ultimately responds to the powerlessness and oppression of the poor. Outside of the Lord's Prayer, her *Magnificat* is the most precious prayer we have in the Gospels.

But John's Gospel gives Mary a different role. Here she is never called by her name but is always called "the mother of Jesus." For John, Mary is the new Eve, the mother of everyone: Jesus, the beloved disciple, you, me, and the world itself. And that is truly something to celebrate.

At this historic event, more than 80,000 Catholics of all ages will gather in Indianapolis to reconsecrate their hearts to the source and summit of our faith.

YEAR OF GOING OUT ON MISSION: July 21, 2024 – Pentecost 2025

Having enkindled a missionary fire in the hearts of the American faithful, the Holy Spirit will send us out on mission to share the gift of our Eucharistic Lord as we enter the universal Church's jubilee year in 2025.

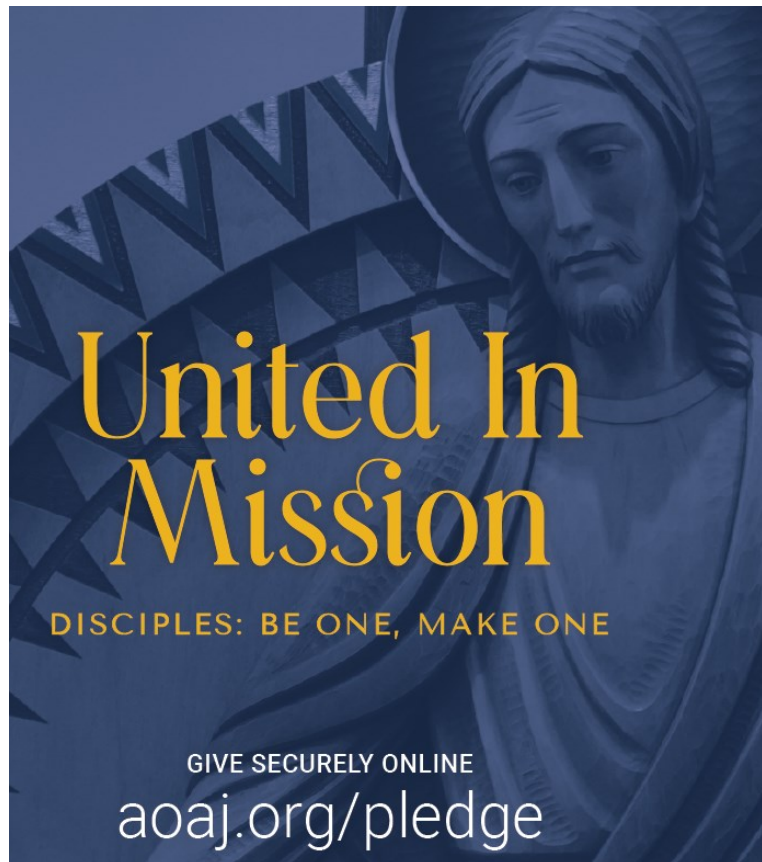
Director of Faith Formation

** Please note that the total rebate amounts for the past three years (FY20-FY22) have averaged \$18,000 per year. In order to meet the \$18,000 average rebate for this year (2022), Holy Cross would need to collect more pledges to increase the "Total Pledged" amount to \$58,620.
