## Reflections

## Dec 24: 4th Sunday of Advent

Mary receives her calling in a moment of solitude, stressing her utter uniqueness and salvation history. But Gabriel's message ends with a reference to Elizabeth. This serves not only to affirm God's power with another miraculous conception but also to place Mary back into the context of her community and her relationships. Like her, we do not receive our callings and isolation. We are always part of a larger story.

## "How can this be?"

[This] is what I learned from Gabriel. He saw in me more than I saw in myself and troubled my ordinariness with the announcement of a full and unfolding grace. I became both cooperator and observer. The moment I said, "Yes," I swam in rivers not of my own making. How little we know! How much we have to trust! Hold my hand. I will take you to the place where the spirit rejoices, where lowliness becomes largeness, where all space and time is pregnant, where the center has no circumference, where the divine child lays his head upon the breast of your earth. My question is the answer I found when I said, "Let it be." John Shea, adapted from Seeing Haloes

## Dec 25: Nativity of the Lord

The nativity offers the chance to look at the year anew, and to contemplate how we have built the kingdom, humbly in our own lives. Professional grandeur and sweeping accomplishments have no place here in this manger. This is a place for the unremarkable things: cows and chickens, and a good rest after a long. This is a place for the mundane to be made new. This is a place to contemplate how everyday moments from the past year have been filled with an unnoticed dignity: trips to the grocery store, family dinners, morning routines, the laundry, the coffee break, the video calls home.

## **Our Birth into Peace**

[T]oday's feast of Christmas renews for us the sacred beginning of the life of Jesus, son of the Virgin Mary, and we find that in celebrating our Savior's birth we also celebrate our own.

The birth of Christ is the origin of the Christian people, and the birthday of the head is also the birthday of the body. . . .

But what can we find in the treasury of the Lord's bounty [that is] more in keeping with the glory of this feast than that peace which was first announced by the angelic choir on the day of his birth? For peace makes us children of God; it nourishes love and is the mother of unity; it is the repose of the blessed and our home in eternity. The work of peace and its special blessing is to unite to God those whom it separates from the world.

Therefore, let those who have been born not [by natural generation nor by human choice nor by a man's decision] but of God, offer to the Father their harmony as sons and daughters united in peace. . . . Between the hearts and minds of those refashioned according to [the image of Christ] there should be harmony.

The birthday of the Lord is the birthday of peace. St. Leo the Great, Sermon 6 on the Nativity of the Lord

St. Leo the Great (ca. 400–461) was elected pope in 440 and was named a Doctor of the Church in 1754.

## On the Way Home from Mass...

What did the angel say to the shepherds? "Do not be afraid! A savior has been born! You will find the infant wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger." Why do you think Jesus came as a helpless baby wrapped in swaddling clothes rather than as a powerful king with an army? What could this mean for us?

## Dec 31: Feast of the Holy Family

In a church that affirms the goodness of children and the sacredness of the work of parenting, there can be a tendency to equate family size with holiness. But, the Holy Family had only one child, and this group of three serves as a model for all our families, regardless of size. Large families are beautiful gift to the church, visible sign of God's life-giving creativity. And God calls us to a legitimate variety of family sizes and is no less present in smaller families too.

## A Primal, Wild Kind of Love

Luscious images of overflowing abundance greet us in the Scriptures on this feast of the Holy Family. In Sirach and the human being give birth to God? This feast proclaims God's psalm: riches and long life, fruitful vines and olive plants, families gathered around the table. And from Colossians, a good roadmap for a happy domestic life together: "Put on . . . heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience. . . . And over all these put on love."

And yet the scene of the Presentation in the Gospel appears to turn much of this imagery on its head. Mary and Joseph's offering of two turtle doves is the sacrifice of those too poor to afford a lamb. In this, and in the mysterious, unsettling words of Simeon, we learn that this Holy Family will defy expectations. Instead of domestic bliss and familial abundance, we find images of humble poverty, of a mother's heart pierced by suffering, of a sign of contradiction that will be violently opposed. What parent would ever want to hear these words about their beloved child?

And yet family life, even in the best of times, is both an adoptive parents. abundance of love and an abundance of vulnerability born from that love. What parents haven't had their hearts pierced with love or concern for their children? Who hasn't felt the utter poverty of being unable to protect children from all that fills a frightening world? To love is to be vulnerable to suffering, and parenting elicits a primal, wild kind of love.

That little infant held by Simeon, that tiny sign of contradiction, will grow up and teach his disciples to call God abba, or papa, and show us that God loves prodigally, boundlessly, and even carelessly. And our Blessed Mother Mary, her heart pierced, reveals this too, embodying a fierce, tender love that scoops us up into her arms and holds us tight.

The Gospel reveals that the heart of God is a humble heart, a broken heart—a heart pierced by an abundant love beyond our wildest expectations.

## Jan 1: Solemnity of Mary

The shepherds work with animals; they know mangers. A contemporary equivalent to this scene world be an office worker visiting someone else's office and finding that someone has given birth on a desk. The extraordinary has entered the very mundane, the very ordinary. God really truly entered into this life. Our life. And God remains with us, here and now, present in our midst.

## **Amazing Faces**

Today's feast celebrates an impossibility. How could a unutterable closeness, expressed in life-giving paradox. Aaron is told to bless Israel, saying: "The LORD let his face shine upon you, and be gracious to you! / The LORD look upon you kindly and give you peace!" But God tells Moses: "You cannot see my face, for no one can see me and live" (Exod 33:20). Israel longs for what could seemingly destroy her.

But in Jesus, God's face at last becomes visible. Mary's motherhood is not merely a biological fact. Her smiles brought to light the radiant smile for which Israel had longed. Among the first to see that face were the shepherds, people who were "faceless" and of no account.

Friends of mine adopted a Vietnamese baby, Ben, orphaned by the war. He never smiled, for no one had ever smiled at him before. One day, as we prepared for Mass, he amazed us with his first smile, the fruit of the love of his

God has smiled on us. We did not die, but he did, that joy might be eternal. Mick Jagger of the Rolling Stones sang: "You don't want to walk and talk about Jesus / You just want to see his face." Every Christian has the maternal task of bringing the divine life-giving smile to birth in others, especially on the faces of those who are despised or unnoticed.
